B009-B011 – Using Shared Leadership to Eliminate Achievement Gaps Across Your District

Justin Fryer - Superintendent of Lisbon Public School District, Andrea Johnson -Sheyenne Valley Special Education Unit Director, Patricia Schmit - Lisbon High School English Teacher

Lisbon Public School District has implemented a districtwide steering committee the past two years. The committee's job is to ensure that our school district is evaluating progress towards needs assessment goals and our strategic plan. The committee reviews and desegregates data, surveys key stakeholder groups, adjusts the MTSS process as needed, and monitors special education program processes. With these direct actions, this committee has significantly impacted our district in a positive way. We have been able to accomplish many of our districtwide goals and continue to make tangible progress across our school district. Participants who attend this session will gain an understanding of how to desegregate student achievement data to improve the MTSS process and special education programing. Additionally, participants will learn how to implement a districtwide steering committee. This committee will help districts improve stakeholder buy-in to increase project success rate throughout their school district.

B109-B111– Differentiating Professional Learning

B112 – State of Career and Technical Education in North Dakota

Wayde Sick - State Director of ND Department of Career and Technical Education

B009-B011 – Updates to the Academic, CTE, and North Dakota Scholarship

Jim Upgren - Assistant Director, Office of School Approval & Opportunity for NDDPI

This session will provide updates to the \$6,000 Academic, CTE, and North Dakota Scholarship program. Highlights include the requirements for each scholarship, legislative updates, and the transition and timeline from the traditional Academic/CTE Scholarship to the new North Dakota Scholarship aligned with Choice Ready.

B109-B111 – ABLE in School

Dr. Cory Steinter - Superintendent of Northern Cass School District, Kim Pladson - President & CEO of TNT Fitness

A physical education class. Removing barriers between special needs students and their peers through a curriculum that is interactive and engaging. It helps the higher-level students better understand special needs learners and how they can help assist them throughout their school day. Every learner matters!

ABLE in Action is an ecosystem designed to support inclusion in public education. The curriculum largely focuses on peer-to-peer learning, physical outputs, and social and emotional learning for distribution in rural and urban communities across North Dakota.

ABLE in School goes beyond the status quo by diligently advocating for a permanent system in education for the benefit of special needs students. This kind of curriculum does not currently exist. The ecosystem is designed and can be implemented in any size school district with fewer resources yet meet and serve the needs in urban districts. It is important that rural schools are being served so that special needs students can have access to the resources, curriculum, and be workforce ready after their years of high school and/or transition years.

Students with special needs require higher levels of inclusion with peer engagement. Envision how 13 years of inclusion will lead them to be stronger physically, emotionally, and socially. It also embeds 'ability' in the peer. TNT's case study observed improved physical performance due to peer motivation, socialization, and exercise. In North Dakota alone, there are over 17,500 children on an IEP. Of those, approximately 9,500 children can be considered for the future workforce. As a society, we need to include special needs students in as many inclusive opportunities as they transition throughout their K-12 years and into adulthood so they too can be recognized and considered work force ready and active member of community.

Preparing for a State Civil Rights Visit**

About the Speaker

Monsignor James Patrick Shea serves as president of the University of Mary.

Monsignor Shea was inaugurated in 2009 as the sixth president of the university and, at the age of 34, became the youngest college or university president in the United States.

He succeeded the late Sister Thomas Welder, O.S.B., who had served as president for 31 years.

The oldest of eight children, Monsignor Shea grew up on a dairy and grain farm near Hazelton, North Dakota, just 38 miles from the University of Mary campus. He began his undergraduate work at Jamestown College, majoring in English and history. He then entered the seminary for the Diocese of Bismarck, earning a bachelor's degree and a pontifical master's degree (licentiate) in philosophy at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He studied classical Greek at the University of Texas at Austin and continued at the Vatican's North American College, studying theology at the Gregorian and Lateran universities in Rome. He has studied management at the University of Chicago's Graduate School of Business and is also an alumnus of the Institutes for Higher Education at the Graduate School of Education, Harvard University. Monsignor Shea has worked with Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity at the Gift of Peace AIDS Hospice while teaching religion at two inner-city elementary schools in Washington, D.C. In Rome, he served as chaplain for the Bambino Gesù Children's Hospital and also at the Rome campus of the Center for Catholic Studies at the University of Saint Thomas. Following his ordination to the priesthood in 2002, he returned to North Dakota and served as an associate pastor in Bismarck and Mandan. During that time, he was also the chaplain and an instructor at Saint Mary's Central High School in Bismarck. He then served as pastor to parishes in Killdeer and Halliday (North Dakota), while teaching at Trinity High School in Dickinson. Deeply committed to the education and formation of young people, he has been an inspirational teacher and mentor for many students.

B009-B011 – Poverty Escape Room

The Poverty Escape Room isn't a traditional simulation. More and more groups are asking for a smaller group training to experience an understanding of the crisis of poverty, so the Poverty Escape Room was developed. We all know you can't truly "escape" poverty, but could you survive a day in the life of someone in the crisis of poverty? In the Poverty Escape Room Simulation, participants experience one day of the life of an individual who lives in poverty, experience firsthand the barriers those living in poverty are asked to navigate each day, and will then be asked to discuss the simulation experience with other participants. The hope is to bring awareness of how poverty impacts those students we work with on a daily basis and to begin conversations around supports we, as educators, might need as we continue our journey in providing afterschool experiences.
